
Sueños (Dreams) Grete Stern




Sueño no. 2 "En el andén", 1949

In the late 1940's, German photographer Grete Stern was approached by the Buenos Aires based magazine Idilio, to collaborate with a prominent psychoanalyst on a regular feature. "Psychoanalysis Will Help You", was a regular analysis of the dreams Idilio readers sent in to the magazine. While Professor Gino Germani interpreted dreams through text, Stern explored the unconscious in photomontage, an approach she was familiar with through her association with the German Expressionists. Stern was born in Germany and lived there until the political climate, transforming under the Weimar Republic, prompted her to emigrate to Argentina. There, she made a name for herself as a portraitist, photographing fashionable intellectuals of the day, among them Jorge Luis Borges and Bertold Brecht.

Stern's work has strong ties to the Surrealist movement, then at its most influential in Europe, with a focus on dreams and the subconscious as a key to wider, more profound perception. The process of photomontage exaggerates the surreal quality of her work, magnifying dramatic and disruptive shifts in scale creating bizarre spaces and spatial relationships. At the same time, because her work was approached as magazine illustration, it is direct and unpretentious

Born in 1904, Grete Stern lived and worked in Germany, England and Argentina. She studied at the Bauhaus and, before leaving Europe in the early 1930's, was a partner, with Ellen Auerbach, in the design studio *ringl* + *pit* in Berlin. She died last year in Buenos Aires.
