C/R/I/T/I/C/S was formed by Justin Gradin and Andrea Lukic in the fall of 2008, with the intention of exploring their mutual obsession with music and narratives on the margins of popular culture.

In Dual Broadcasts: A Ceremony of Symphonies, C/R/I/T/I/C/S employ the help of saxophonist Keith Wecker, and dancer/percussionist Daniel Pitout. This ceremony is split, as half of the performers are on tour with their band at the time of the ritual, yet they are represented by a projected image. Dual Broadcasts is the second public performance by C/R/I/T/I/C/S/ and is the first on How To Make Music.

Skeena Reece (Vancouver, BC) is Tsimshian Cree, a working artist, and administrator since 1996. Her multi-disciplinary practice includes: performance art, spoken word, humour, "sacred clowning", writing, singing, songwriting, video art, and arts administration. Skeena was past Director of the Indigenous Media Arts; organizer of the 8th Annual IMAGeNation Aboriginal Film and Video Festival; and Founder and Artistic Director of the Native Youth Artists Collective (Vancouver) for two years.

Riot Songs

Performing under the band name Riot Songs, **Cranfield & Slade** will present a set of classic punk rock cover songs that engage with punk's past as a possible, if idealized, sub-cultural expression of generalized discontent and politicized anger (responses provoked for many by the events of the 2010 Olympic games). While punk continues to signify in that critical and negative spirit, it also constitutes yet another selection of style-based goods, significantly one now steeped in layers of nostalgia and cliché. It is precisely that mixed, ambiguous and compromised character, however, that adds to the peculiar richness of punk as a subject to explore again.

Riot Songs will pay tribute to bands such as DOA, Stiff Little Fingers, Subhumans, Dead Kennedys, Fear, Circle Jerks, Stiffs, The Rezillos, The Clash, and The Dils. The concert will be recorded live for release as 10 Riot Songs, a ten-inch vinyl record.

Riot Songs is made up of Kathy Slade (vocals), Brady Cranfield (drums), Chris Harris (vocals/guitar), Christa Min (guitar), and Richard Trawick (bass).

Cranfield & Slade are Vancouver-based artists Kathy Slade and Brady Cranfield. Together they produce work that engages with the intriguing and manifold interconnection between visual art and music. Cranfield & Slade's work places instances of popular culture and music in juxtaposition with examples from contemporary art and art history. Their concept album 12 *Sun Songs* was released in the fall of 2009 by Christoph Keller Editions for JRP|Ringier (Zürich) and the Or Gallery (Vancouver).

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Hello World

The Thursdays Writing Collective provides a space for self-determination and the joy of creativity. Now in its second year, the Collective has attracted 50 participants ranging in age from 18–83 years old, spanning elementary to post-secondary education. Thursdays has published three anthology chapbooks with Otter Press and has given numerous public readings, bringing the group into fruitful collaboration with writers from different communities. Right away I wanted to manage the band and I took them out for dinner to Bao Bei to see if they would bite. We spoke about the way that mythologies come into being and the way bass strings get boiled back into shape. We spoke about money. I next saw them in the summer open for Destroyer at a bar in Mt. Pleasant. They look like they drank olive oil."

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Rodney Graham

Rodney Graham was born in Vancouver, where he continues to live and work. He is a prolific creator and has exhibited a wide range of art forms as video, photography, music, sculpture, drawing and installation. He studied at the University of British Columbia, originally pursuing a degree in Literature. In the 1970's he founded new-wave band UJ3RK5 (pronounced "you jerk") with artists Jeff Wall, Ian Wallace and Frank Johnston, playing and touring widely.
